## Approval for NACC DA almost finalised

N ews from Council is that staff are now close to finalising approval of the development application for our Arts & Community Centre. We submitted the DA in mid September so it has been a long wait.

Meanwhile the School of Arts committee has applied for another grant. It's an Infrastructure grant (\$140,455 EX GST) from the Office of Responsible Gambling for professional fees for various consultants for the detailed design drawings to get us from the DA stage to the Construction Certificate stage These include architects, various engineers, surveyors, fire consultants, energy consultants).

Thanks to figures from Neil Mumme and ClarkeKeller, we were able to put together a reasonable application.


Laurelle Pacey read a few appropriate words.



#### More on BlazeAid

The Cobargo BlazeAid camp currently has about 45 volunteers; about 10 are grey nomads unable to return to their own homes, while the rest are backpackers who have no option but ride out the pandemic at Cobargo. Rob Bradley reports the backpackers were initially distressed at their predicament, but now recognise they are in one of the safest places for this period. They have settled in and feel they are contributing in a good way to people who really need their help.

Following a hunch by Judy Whiting that BlazeAid volunteers might need winter items, Rob asked. Sure enough, they did; backpackers hadn't planned to be camping over winter. So Rob put out a call to our SOA BlazeAid catering crew and various friends and the response was amazing.

"Thanks so much for the tremendous response and your generosity," Rob said. "Borgy Leakey kindly took down a full car load on Friday and Kate Wall the next day.

"We ended up with a wonderful range including 10 doonas, five sleeping bags, some pillows and a few woollen blankets, many jumpers, sweatshirts, polar fleeces and jackets, beanies, socks and thermals. Thanks to all and please pass it on to your friends who also donated.

"All in all I think the camp will be warm this winter and perhaps farmers will also benefit from more than just their cosier volunteers."
